Innovation is Part of the Federal Government's Mission

Bayh-Dole Act

- **Non-profits**, including universities, and small businesses may elect to **retain title to innovations** developed under federally-funded research programs.
- Universities are **expected to file patents** on inventions they elect to own.
- Universities are **encouraged to collaborate** with commercial concerns to promote the utilization of inventions arising from federal funding.
- **Federal Government Rights**
 - **Granted a non-exclusive license** to practice the patent throughout the world
 - **Retains March-in Rights** (not generally a concern)



Innovation Is Part of SUNY's Mission

§ 335.28 Patents and Inventions Policy

- All **inventions** made by faculty members, employees, students, and all others **utilizing university facilities** at any of the State-operated institutions of State University **shall belong to State University**
- For the meritorious services of the inventor and in consideration of the inventor's agreement that the invention shall belong to the university, **40 percent of the gross royalties shall be paid to inventors.**

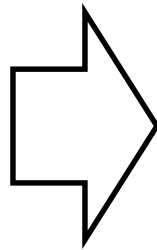

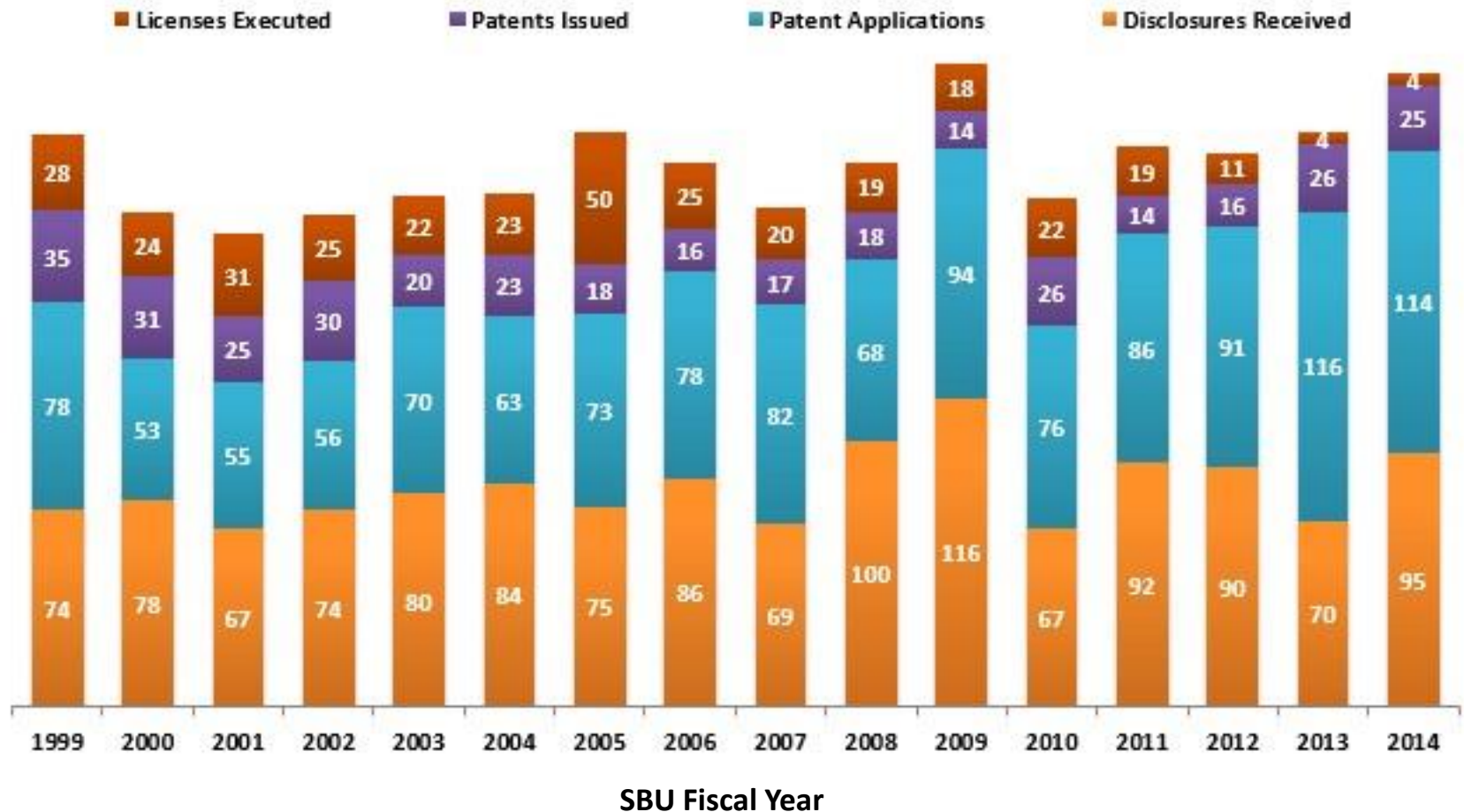

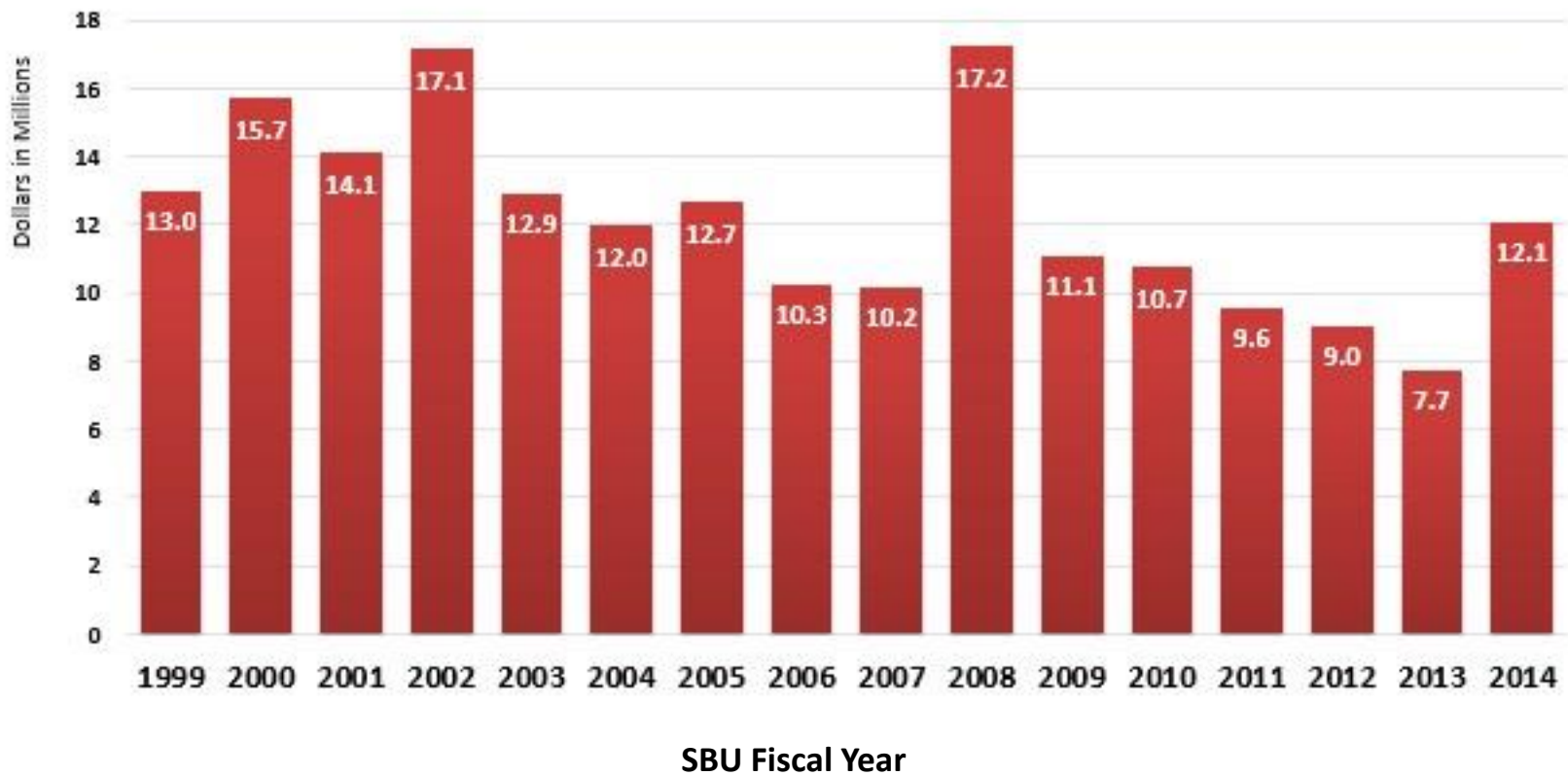
